I.	Preclude common objections.
II.	Create a smooth transition into the gospel.
III.	Earn the right to ask personal questions.
IV.	Determine the spiritual condition of the person
V.	Create a desire for the gospel.
VI.	Gain permission to share the gospel.
Exp	lanation of the Introduction

- I. Conversation: A time to get to know the person.
- II. Opening Question:
 - A. Personal commitment to share the gospel.
 - B. Ask permission to move the conversation to a deeper level.
- III. Diagnostic Question #1
 - A. Assumes a religious journey.
 - B. Ascertains the "degree of assurance."
 - C. Directs the thinking of the individual to spiritual issues.
 - D. Possible answers:
 - 1. Respond to their answer.
 - 2. Give your personal testimony.
- IV. Transition Question:
- V. Diagnostic Question #2
 - A. Asks the person what they are trusting in for assurance.
 - B. Assumes "common grace", what all men know about God.
 - 1. His existence
 - 2. Personal sin
 - 3. Reward and punishment
 - C. Provides specific information for your presentation.

"Yes"

"That's wonderful, very few people today have a certain knowledge that they are going to heaven."

"No" or "I don't know"

"It is interesting that about 90% of the people that I meet answer 'no' or 'I don't know' to that question."

"As a matter of fact the most amazing discovery that I ever made was that the Bible was written in order that we may 'know' that we have eternal life. I John 5:13"

IV. "Would you mind if I asked you another question?"

"Yes"

Go back to conversation to learn more and earn the right to ask questions.

"No"

V. "If you were to die tonight and stand before God and He were to say to you, 'NAME, why should I let you into my heaven?' What would you say?"

"I don't know"

"What do you think you would say?"

"I still don't know"

"I know you don't regularly think about this question, but what would others (you church etc.) say?" "I still don't know"

"Would you say that you get to heaven by doing good, going to church, etc.?"

Or "I used to think that you get to heaven by being as good as you can, would you agree?"

"Faith in Christ"

"That's great, would you like to share with me how you came to this conclusion that you get to heaven by 'his words'?"

"Works or Merit"

"When we began I thought I had good news for you, now I know that I have good news for you. As a matter of fact what you will hear in the next few minutes will be the best news you have ever heard."

VI. "That's some statement isn't it?"

"Yes"

"Would you like me back that up?"

"No"

"If I were to tell you that heaven is an absolutely free gift to anyone who wishes to receive it what would you say?"



Purposes of the Invitation

To clarify the information presented in the gospel. a. b. To involve the person in the decision making process. To solve the problems of "the point of decision." i. An inability to close the presentation. To avoid pressure tactics. ii. To prevent decisions without understanding or conviction. To provide a forum for handling objections to making a decision. "This could cause problems in my family." i. "I have tried before but it didn't work." ii. "I'm nervous, uneasy, afraid." iii. "I don't want to change." "I'm just not sure." To provide an opportunity for an expression of faith in prayer. e. i. To clarify the decision that was just made. To say thank you for what God has done. ii. Explanation of the Invitation The Clarifying Question. Give the person an opportunity to express their thinking.

S	OK, all you need to do is agree with God that you are a sinner and that you deserve death. To thank Him for sending Jesus to die in your place. And to tell Him that right now you are trusting in Jesus death as the substitute for your sin."
